Therapy Dog Visits






Regina Library first-floor lounge



1984 by George Orwell is a timeless dystopian novel that explores themes of totalitarianism, surveillance, and the manipulation of truth. The story follows Winston Smith, a man living under the oppressive regime of Big Brother, where every aspect of life is controlled and monitored. Orwell intended his novel as a warning. Some see



similarities to today. Surveillance: Just as in Orwell's world, modern society grapples with pervasive surveillance through technology, from CCTV cameras to data tracking by corporations and governments. Misinformation: The concept of "doublethink" and the manipulation of truth in the novel mirrors today's concerns about the spread of misinformation. Written seventy-five years ago, Orwell's 1984 remains a powerful warning about the dangers of unchecked power and the importance of safeguarding our freedoms and truth.
